


Year 3 Home Learning Letter – 27.04.20

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Handwriting	<p>Practise these words using the letters from the Abracadabra family. Then think of one word that uses each letter to practice. We're going to start using our **Nearly Numbers** to help us solve different calculations today. These can really help us to speed up our working out!

$$245 + 99 = ?$$

I could work this out by counting on 99 jumps of 1. But that would take me ages! I've got chocolate to eat!

Some of you might choose to make 9 jumps of 10 and then 9 jumps of 1. But this would still take a bit of time...

$$245 + 100 = 345$$

99 is very close to 100. So I can add on 100 (which is quick and easy!) and then adjust the difference.

$$345 - 1 = 344$$

99 is only 1 away from 100 so I just need to take away one from my answer.
